



MATCH PREVIEW - Michael Duffy

UCD come into tonight's game in second place in the First Division table eight points adrift of leaders Shelbourne. Wanderers have dropped to seventh place in the table after two successive defeats.

UCD have won three, drawn one and lost one of their five away games this season.

Bray Wanderers have only recorded one home win from five home games this season. They have drawn two and lost two of the five home games. Wanderers have conceded 13 goals in the league this season with seven of them been conceded in two games against Shelbourne.

UCD started the season well and were unbeaten in their opening eight league games of the season, winning five of the eight games. Since then, they have lost two of their last three games including a surprise 2-1 home defeat to Cobh Ramblers last week.

The sides played out a scoreless draw when they met earlier this season at the Belfield Bowl in April.

UCD manager Andy Myler is a former Bray Wanderers player who made 21 appearances in all competitions and scored three goals for the club in his one season at the Carlisle Grounds in 2008. Current Bray Wanderers manager Gary Cronin was a team-mate of Myler's that season with Wanderers.

UCD striker Colm Whelan is joint top goal scorer in the First Division this season alongside Ryan Brennan (Shelbourne) having netted nine times apiece so far this season. Next up for the students is Liam Kerrigan on four goals followed by Dara Keane & Harvey O'Brien on three goals apiece.

Bray Wanderers struck five minutes into added time to earn a point in this First Division top of the table encounter at the Carlisle Grounds.

The visitors took the lead after only eleven minutes, when skipper Alan Mahon flicked on a long clearance by Darren Quigley. Colm Tresson's back header to Chris O'Connor was short and Robbie Martin nipped in to lob the ball past O'Connor and into the open goal.

Bray deservedly equalised just past the half hour. After a sustained attacking period resulted in Conor Kenna bringing down Eamon Zayed in the penalty area. Zayed stepped up himself and scored low past the diving Quigley.

The early stages of the second half were even. With a quarter of an hour left UCD went in front. Pat Sullivan went on a great run through the centre from half-way, and then found the unmarked Mick O'Donnell who duly fired to the net past O'Connor.

Wanderers pressed hard for an equaliser in the final minutes and forced three corners in the final five minutes. Five minutes into added time Eddie Gormley's corner from the right was headed on at the near post by Kevin Grogan and blocked by Quigley but the loose ball was pounced on by Kieran 'Tarzan' O'Brien who fired to the roof of the net for a deserved equaliser for the home side.





QUIGLEY'S WORLD OF FOOTBALL

"Dixie" By Brian Quigley

What's the connection between the Everton legend Dixie Dean and the [now defunct] Channel 4 soap opera 'Brookside'? Fans of the soap – which was great – will know that it was set in Liverpool, so this might be an obvious connection. The connection I had in mind though was Harry Cross, the curmudgeonly pensioner who resided on Brookside Close between 1983 and 1990.

Harry Cross was played by the actor Bill Dean. Dixie Dean's full birth name was William Dean. Bill Dean's birth name was Patrick Connolly. After serving in World War Two, Connolly, who was born in Everton, eventually went into acting, taking the stage name Bill Dean in honour of his hero; he'd been in the stands at Goodison to witness many of the 383 goals in 433 appearances.

Connolly had also encountered Dixie during the war, in a roundabout way. The future Harry Cross was present when an Italian prisoner of war shouted abuse at his captors mocking 'Your Winston Churchill and your Dixie Dean' upon being captured. No doubt that brought a smile to Connolly's face; for me it symbolizes the futility of war – in other circumstances, Connolly and the Italian could have been united in watching Dixie strut his stuff on the soccer pitch.

Dixie started off in 1923 at Tranmere Rovers, the local side for a boy from Birkenhead. After many years of glory at Everton he moved on to Notts County, where his career was ended prematurely by the outbreak of World War Two. He wound down his playing days with a spell at Sligo Rovers in 1939, helping Rovers to an

FAI Cup final [they lost to Shelbourne]. Dixie fondly remembered his time in Sligo later in life; he had been treated very well by the people of the town.

Dixie is perhaps most famous for scoring 60 league goals during the 1927-28 campaign, a truly staggering strike-rate that in my opinion will never be beaten. The statue of him erected outside Goodison Park in 2001 was fully deserved.

As a boy Dixie had opted to go to school in a borstal, even though he wasn't a juvenile offender, because the soccer facilities and opportunities were better there than in regular school. That's dedication, in my book! When he was still a teenager and making his way at Tranmere, Dean's career was almost ended before it had begun as a result of a horrific injury in a reserve game against Altrincham; thankfully, he was able to continue playing.

Dean died in 1980 of a heart attack whilst attending a Merseyside derby at Goodison Park; he had had his right leg amputated in 1976 due to a blood clot, a cruel blow.

Back to Patrick Connolly. Or rather, Bill Dean. His Harry Cross character returned to Brookside Close in 1999 in a memorable storyline that involved Cross coming back to the close in the mistaken belief that he still lived there, due to suffering from Alzheimer's. The actor – whose performance as Jack in 'Oh No, It's Selwyn Froggitt' in the 1970's was as brilliant as his later role of Harry Cross, died in 2000.

It's not gone away, you know

Mícheál Ó hUanacháin looks at the latest rounds in the permanent battle between the game and the money-men



With very little fanfare – especially when compared to the wall-to-wall coverage of its abortive launch last April – most of the clubs involved in the European Super League last week 'agreed' with UEFA that they would donate significant money to the game.

The English Premier League clubs, the two Milan teams and Spanish champions Atletico Madrid, will lose 5% of their revenue from UEFA competitions (for just one season), and between them give €15m to grassroots football. Given the joint revenues of €3 billion for just the English six in 2019/20, that's a slap on the wrist. They have, however, also tied themselves into penalty clauses if they get up to any similar shenanigans in the future: up to €150m fines (each) for signing up to any breakaway.

The English clubs also settled with the Premier League along the same lines, with a separate €25m payment, and liability for €30m fines and the loss of 30 points for any future misbehaviour.

The big beasts of the whole plan, Barcelona and Real Madrid, together with Juventus (2019/20 revenue almost €3 bn between them), are still subject to disciplinary procedures, as they haven't repudiated the Super League idea. And the inevitable legal arguments and litigation that will follow the debacle could threaten a lot of what holds international football together.

But intriguing as all this may be, and worthy of a bit more publicity than it has got to date, it pales into insignificance compared with the grenade lobbed into the August proceedings of the FIFA Annual Congress last month, proposing that the World Cup be held every two years.

Since its inauguration in 1930, football's top international competition has been held every four years, like the Olympics. Of course, there's nothing magic about the four-year cycle, which ensures there will not be a clash with the quadrennial Olympic cycle, which in turn echoes the timeline of the ancient Greek sporting festival. Over the years, the cycles of other sporting bodies, and of other competitions within soccer, have settled into that pattern.

But the Saudi Arabian Football Federation (SAFF) successfully argued that FIFA should examine whether it would be feasible to hold the top national team competitions (both men's and women's) more frequently, and the federation will now look at that prospect.

A two-year cycle would force many of the continental federations to completely revamp their qualification procedures. The Asian Football Confederation, of which Saudi Arabia is a member, ran its qualifiers in a sequence that began in June 2019 and will not be complete until June 2022. That process would not survive a change to a two-year World Cup cycle.

Nevertheless, the Saudi federation's President, Yasser Al-Misehal, argued that it is urgent to look at "whether the current four-year cycle remains the optimum basis for how football is managed both from a competition and commercial perspective." And FIFA president Gianni Infantino favours a shake-up, as there is "insufficient balance" in the current system, with money and player talent concentrated in the hands of too few clubs.

Arsène Wenger, who is now head of football development with FIFA, made a similar call earlier this year, but neither the Saudi federation nor the former Arsenal boss was the first to envisage such a change. Nor was CONMEBOL, the south American federation which in 2018 called for a two-year cycle. And even Sepp Blatter, who made a like suggestion back in 1999, was not the first. The rigidity of avoiding the Olympics irks some people who have no interest in anything but their own game.

But of course, there's more to it than that. Kieran Maguire, writing for *Al-Arabiya*, noted that "FIFA's annual accounts reveal that it loses money three years out of every four, and relies on the success of the World Cup to underwrite losses in other years. ... It is easy to see why a more regular FIFA World Cup would have some appeal, as extra revenues would result in higher

payouts to member associations." As then Conmebol President Alejandro Domínguez had said in relation to his 2018 proposal, "In terms of economics FIFA make money and give more money."

Perhaps that's why Giovanni Infantino sat on the fence on the issue, knowing as he does that the strongest opposition to such a proposal will likely come from UEFA, which almost single-handedly shot down Blatter's idea in 1999.

Supply and demand, the ruling forces of economics, would seem to argue in the opposite direction: scarcer products can command higher prices: give TV executives a World Cup every other year, and the response may well become "no, not this year, we had it just the summer before last."

And this change is being examined in the interest of the fans, apparently. The people who have to save up for three years to travel to the Cup in the fourth – or in some cases have to repay what they spent at the Cup during the three years afterwards, before going mad again.

And the proposal is made at a time when team managers throughout Europe as well as further afield are moaning as never before about fixture congestion.

Apart from the financial attraction for FIFA, there is one other consideration worth bearing in mind, remembering the source of the current study. The countries of the Middle East are not traditionally strong field sports countries. Qatar, which will host the 2022 tournament, is widely believed to have sought the honour principally to boost its own standing in the world. Money was no object.



Money was no object either for the United Arab Emirates (which include Abu Dhabi, Bahrain and Dubai) to attract Formula 1 races and international golf and tennis tournaments, nor for the Saudis to host both the Italian and Spanish Super-Cups in recent years, despite widespread and continuing well-documented international concern over human, civil and employment rights abuses there

Italy: Pat Bonner, Denis Irwin, Terry Phelan, Phil Babb, Paul McGrath, Roy Keane, Andy Townsend, Steve Staunton, John Sheridan, Ray Houghton, Tommy Coyne. Subs Jason McAteer (for Houghton, 68) & John Aldridge (for Coyne, 89).

2012 The Republic of Ireland were defeated 2-0 by Italy 1-0 in Euro 2012 finals and bowed out of the competition having suffered three defeats in the competition having already lost in the group to Croatia (1-3) and Spain (0-4) in Poland.



THE CARLISLE GROUNDS GROUND REGULATIONS

Entry to the ground is subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations. Entry to the ground constitutes acceptance of the Ground Regulations, and this shall apply in respect of all events within the Ground.

"Ground" means the Carlisle Grounds and all locations owned, occupied or utilised by Bray Wanderers Football Club.

"Events" means any event taking place at the Carlisle Grounds. "BWFC" means Bray Wanderers Football Club.

- 1. Permission to enter the or to remain within the Ground (not withstanding possession of any ticket) is at the absolute discretion of BWFC, any member of Garda Siochana or authorised steward. On no account will admission to any Event be granted to any person not in possession of a valid ticket. On no account will admission to a Football match be granted to a person who is the subject of a current banning order.
- 2. BWFC excludes to the maximum extent permitted by law any liability for loss, injury or damage to persons/property in or around the Ground.
- 3. No guarantees can be given to BWFC that an Event will take place at a particular time or on a particular date and BWFC reserves the right to reschedule the Event without notice and without any liability whatsoever.
- 4. In the event of the postponement or abandonment of the Event, refunds (If any) should be claimed in accordance with the relevant event organiser's ticket terms and conditions. BWFC will have no other liability whatsoever, including (but not limited to) any indirect or consequential loss or damage, such as (but not limited) loss of enjoyment or travel costs.
- 5. All persons seeking entrance to the Ground acknowledge BWFC's right to search any person whether outside or inside the Ground and to refuse entry to or eject from the Ground any person refusing to submit to such a search
- 6. The following articles must not be brought within the Ground knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground.
- 7. The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. BWFC may impose a ban from the Ground as a result.
- 1. Racial, homophobic or discriminatory abuse, chanting or harassment, or any such banners or flags, is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. BWFC may impose a ban from the Ground as a result.
- 8 Conviction of any of the following may result in a banning order being made -
- 8.1 The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse
- 8.2 The chanting of anything of an indecent or racialist nature.
- 8.3 The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.
- 8.4 Attempting to enter the Ground or being inside the ground whilst drunk.
- 8.5 Being in possession of any intoxicating liquor or can or other portable container and which could cause damage or personal injury, when entering the ground or in public area of the Ground from which the event can be directly viewed.
- 9. All persons entering the Ground may only occupy the seat/area allocated to them by their ticket and must not move from any one part of the ground to another without the express permission or instruction of any steward, officer of BWFC and/or any member of An Garda Siochana.
- 10. Nobody may stand in any seating area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the Ground.
- 11. The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places is strictly forbidden. Nobody entering the Ground shall be permitted to climb any structures within the Ground.
- 12. Smoking in No-Smoking Areas is strictly forbidden.
- 13. Mobile telephones and other communications devices are permitted within the Ground provided that they are used for personal and private use only.
- 14. Any individual who has entered any part of the Ground designated for the use of any group of supporters to which they do not belong may be ejected from the Ground either for the purpose of their own safety or for any other reason.
- 15. No person (other than a person who holds an appropriate licence) may bring into the Ground or use within the Ground any equipment which, is capable of recording or transmitting (by digital or other means) any audio, visual or audio-visual material or any information or data in relation to the Event or Ground. Copyright in any unauthorised recording or transmission is assigned to BWFC.
- 16. No goods (including literature) of any nature may be offered either free or for sale by any person within the Ground without the express written permission of BWFC.
- 17. Tickets are not transferable and may not be offered for sale without the prior written permission of BWFC. Any tickets offered for sale may be confiscated by any steward or officer of BWFC or any member of An Garda Siochana.
- 18. At all times while present in the Ground, persons must comply with any and all instructions of any steward and/or member of An Garda Siochana. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to immediate ejection from the Ground.
- 19. BWFC reserves absolutely the right to eject from the Ground any person failing to comply with any of the Ground Regulations or whose presence within the Ground is, or could, reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person. This could lead to further action including, but not limited to, a ban from the Ground or proceedings being taken.
- 20. Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the ground Regulations.


