



MATCH PREVIEW - Michael Duffy

Galway United come into tonight's game sitting in second place in the First division. They are currently nine points behind leaders Shelbourne. Galway have won their last five league games and kept four clean sheets in a row.

Bray Wanderers are sitting in fifth place in the table, six points behind the Tribesmen and occupying the final play-off position. Wanderers are unbeaten in their last four games.

Galway had a slow start to the season drawing three and losing one of their four opening games played on the pitch. They were eventually awarded a 3-0 walk over win over Cabinteely for the late postponement of their game scheduled for Stradbrook in early April.

Gary Shaw scored the winner for Wanderers in injury time in the earlier meeting of the sides at Eamon Deacy Park in May. Joe Doyle had given Bray an early lead before Ruairi Keating equalised for the home side on 34 minutes. This game was John Caulfield's first game in charge of Galway United.

Galway have added to their squad in recent weeks. Goalkeeper Luke Dennison joined from Longford Town. Thomas Oluwa joined from Bohemians having played for Shamrock Rovers B team last season. Much travelled Joe Gorman has also signed from Longford Town. Joe had a spell with Bray Wanderers in 2014 when he made nine league appearances Stephen Christopher and goalkeeper Michael Garrihy departed the club last week.

Ruairi Keating is in third place in the goalscoring charts in the First division this season having netted 8 league goals to date. Bray's Joe Doyle is joint fourth highest with six league goals to date. Joe has scored four times in Wanderers last two home games.

Bray Wanderers have won three, drawn two and lost two of their seven home league games this season.

Galway United's away record this season is won four, drawn one and lost two of their seven away games to date.

Ryan Graydon once again misses out for Wanderers as he has received an additional three match ban for his recent sending off against Athlone Town.

Bray Wanderers scored twice in the closing two minutes of normal time and added time to earn the three points in this First division encounter.

Wanderers went into this game sitting in fourth position in the First division table and a place inside the play off spots. Galway were in sixth place but eight points adrift of a play-off spot.

The visitors opened the brighter, but the home side responded well and their best first half chances fell to John Flood, but he was denied on both occasions by Galway keeper Robert Forde. Galway missed two good opportunities when Moran shot wide as O'Connor advanced to narrow the angle and then Lawless took advantage of a slip but pulled his shot across goal.

Chris O'Connor had to be at his best to save a long range shot from Kevin Walsh in the second half. The game changed with the introduction of Kieran "Tarzan" O'Brien on 72 minutes. O'Brien announced his arrival with a brave header just over, but when Forde could only parry Zayed's low cross O'Brien was quickest to react and fired to the net. With two minutes remaining on the clock. Zayed added a second two minutes into added time to clinch the victory.

Andrew played schoolboy football with Home Farm before moving to Dundalk where he played for the under 17s in 2018.

He is on loan with Bray Wanderers from Dundalk.

QUIGLEY'S WORLD OF FOOTBALL

" Dream Weaver" By Brian Quigley

Harrogate Town could just be the happiest club in the English Football League [EFL]. The North Yorkshire town was voted the happiest place to live in Britain for three years running between 2013 and 2015; to give the residents even more to smile about, the town's soccer club – managed by Simon Weaver – have been winning promotion and after promotion in recent years.

Weaver is currently the longest-serving manager in the EFL, having been in charge of 'The Sulphurites' since 2009, initially as player-manager. When he first took charge the club were in the Conference North [now National League North], a division they were founder-members of in 2004. Weaver made the club's players professional in 2017 and was immediately rewarded with a promotion to the Conference / National League Premier. Two seasons later, in 2020, ascension to the Holy Grail of the EFL was achieved after a play-off win over Notts County.

Weaver's playing career lasted from 1996 to 2012, and took in spells at Sheffield Wednesday, Doncaster Rovers, Ilkeston Town, Nuneaton Burough, Lincoln City, Macclesfield Town, Kidderminster Harriers, Scarborough, York City, Tamworth, Boston United, Kings Lynn and Redditch United before he came to Harrogate in 2009; nearly 600 games as manager later [as of May 2021] he is still there.

The club was always a progressive one, going right back through its history, always on an upward curve. When they were founder-members of the North East Counties League in 1982 they had the foresight to install floodlights at their Wetherby Road stadium, to allow for further progression up the pyramid. A game against Leeds United celebrated the installation, with Leeds legend Eddie Gray switching on the lights for the first time. Further innovations included becoming a limited company in 1990 to fund construction of the new main stand, and of course the move to professionalism for the playing staff in 2017.

Harrogate itself a town of 75,000 inhabitants, a population certainly large enough to sustain an EFL side. Its claim-to-fame historically is its status as a spa town, with the iron, sulphur and salt of its waters proving particularly restorative to visitors [the sulphur inspired the club's nickname]. Another thing the town is remembered for is hosting the 1982 Eurovision Song Contest at the Harrogate International Centre [Bardo sang for the UK, The Duskeys for Ireland and Nicole won it for Germany].

Here's one that might come in handy at a pub quiz some time. The FA Trophy is the secondary national knock-out competition to the FA Cup, contested by teams at the upper-end of non-league. EFL teams cannot enter. Only one EFL team has won the FA Trophy while being an EFL side, and that's Harrogate Town. How did this come about? Well, Town qualified for the 2019-20 FA Trophy final against Concord Rangers during their final season as a non-league team. The final wasn't played until May 2021 though, due to the coronavirus pandemic, by which time Town were in League Two!

The Women's Game - Part 2

After the FA's peremptory message to clubs in December 1921, requesting them not to facilitate women's games, things went downhill for the numerous girls' clubs then in existence, rapidly in England, and also, but somewhat slower, abroad.

In France, where there had been a women's League structure as early as 1918, the game was banned in 1932. Spanish women were not permitted to play from the late 1930s - presumably after the Civil War – until 1975. It was against the law for women to play football in Brazil from 1941 to 1979.

In Germany, the gymnastics clubs which were the backbone of the game did not admit women, so the women's game depended on a small number of single-sex clubs. In 1955, the DFB (which had been dissolved by Hitler in 1940 despite going along with the Nazis' policies until then) issued instructions to clubs not to form women's sections.

Russia came late to the ban, the Communist Party banning women's football in the Soviet Union from 1972, because it believed it was a men's sport.

It is somewhat surprising to find that neither the fledgling FAI nor even the deeply conservative IFA followed London's lead in this. In both jurisdictions we can find women's matches played on high-profile clubs' grounds throughout the period of the 'ban'. But that apart, the women's game got no support from the authorities. It didn't stop them playing, largely among themselves, though visitors are recorded too.

Even in England the ladies kept up their play. It took them only five days after the FA's *ukase* in December 1921 to organise a meeting of representatives of more than 30 teams in Liverpool, and from that came the English Ladies Football Association, which soon had a league of 57 teams of amateur players. It didn't last long, but it was a straw in the wind: football's women were not going away.

In 1925, Dick, Kerr's Ladies visited Belfast again to take on the Fémina Sport Club of Paris, at Windsor Park. In 1927, Rutherglen Ladies from Edinburgh played teams in Belfast and Dublin.

Rutherglen Ladies, from Edinburgh, visited both cities in 1927 and played local selections, the Dublin match at Milltown, where Shamrock Rovers had hosted Belfast Celtic for their official opening less than a year previously.

The attitude of the press had, if anything, hardened against the ladies. Dismissive at best, and usually mocking, they indicated a mindset not far from that of the FA, that the game was not only unsuitable for women (and they for it), but potentially harmful to them.

The *Sports Mail's* panel cartoon for the Rutherglen tour was much more friendly, and no more mocking than similar panels published routinely at that time about men's games.



Meanwhile, the Camogie Association, founded in 1904, largely due to the encouragement of Conradh na Gaeilge, was about to run its first All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship in 1932, the fifth time they had set about it. With ten counties participating, this one would succeed – though for various reasons it wasn't concluded until July 1933, when Dublin beat Galway in the Final. Three of the Dublin team were players with Bray United at the time. Their All-Ireland has been run annually ever since, but like the association for ladies Gaelic football the Camogie body remains technically outside the GAA fold.

The nearest thing to a full women's soccer international played in this period was between an Irish selection including the redoubtable Mary Anne "Big Molly" Seaton, possibly the best player of her generation, and a fairly representative French side at Grosvenor Park in August 1936 (the French won 4-1). But though there was a spirited correspondence in the Dublin media the following year about establishing women's teams, that was to be the last significant action on either side of the border until after the Second World War.

When peace returned, so did football – for the men, anyway. The women's game was slower to take off in England, possibly because the FA was still policing its ban. Dick, Kerr's Ladies, now called Preston Ladies after the company withdrew, had continued in existence, but ran out of steam, opponents and places to play, folding in 1965 – just as interest in the game was rising elsewhere.

Little appears to have happened in Ireland outside Dublin until the 1960s, and what developed then was often indoor football, in Louth and the North-West, with notable teams in Donegal, like Buncrana Hearts, winning tournaments in Derry. Seven-a-side teams were also active.

The game was also developing on the East coast, with Dublin teams like Rainbow Swifts appearing in an exhibition match at the Showgrounds in 1962, and at 7-a-side Jacobs beat White Swan Laundry in a warm-up for "the forthcoming tournament at Harolds Cross" in June 1963, showing a pattern of works teams that echoed the earlier development of the men's game.

And a little later in Waterford, where Benfica became the leading team, twelve teams were active in a league, including Santos, Hearts, Rangers and Bilberry Rovers. As the decade drew on, despite the claim of an *Irish Press* columnist in 1967 that "ladies soccer teams are unknown throughout the country", the game spread, with teams being formed in Athlone, Galway and Shannon, Tipperary, Kilkenny and Wexford.

Dundalk rapidly became a high-profile club and were reckoned the Champions of the Republic after defeating Benfica three times in 1968: there was talk of a Championship of Ireland match against Portadown, but I've found no trace of it yet.

That's part of the problem: while the Waterford, Louth and Donegal women's teams were reported in the local press, the women's game in Dublin couldn't find space in the crowded sports pages of the national newspapers – and there was (and is) no local press in Dublin to report on the fortunes of the Jeyes, Urney and McCairns teams, or the public service leagues, active in the 1960s.

Nevertheless, the game was alive and kicking, and only needed official legitimacy to take the next step forward. That would not be long in coming, and from a less than expected direction.



THE CARLISLE GROUNDS GROUND REGULATIONS

Entry to the ground is subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations. Entry to the ground constitutes acceptance of the Ground Regulations, and this shall apply in respect of all events within the Ground.

"Ground" means the Carlisle Grounds and all locations owned, occupied or utilised by Bray Wanderers Football Club.

"Events" means any event taking place at the Carlisle Grounds. "BWFC" means Bray Wanderers Football Club.

- 1. Permission to enter the or to remain within the Ground (not withstanding possession of any ticket) is at the absolute discretion of BWFC, any member of Garda Siochana or authorised steward. On no account will admission to any Event be granted to any person not in possession of a valid ticket. On no account will admission to a Football match be granted to a person who is the subject of a current banning order.
- BWFC excludes to the maximum extent permitted by law any liability for loss, injury or damage to persons/property in or around the Ground.
- 3. No guarantees can be given to BWFC that an Event will take place at a particular time or on a particular date and BWFC reserves the right to reschedule the Event without notice and without any liability whatsoever.
- 4. In the event of the postponement or abandonment of the Event, refunds (If any) should be claimed in accordance with the relevant event organiser's ticket terms and conditions. BWFC will have no other liability whatsoever, including (but not limited to) any indirect or consequential loss or damage, such as (but not limited) loss of enjoyment or travel costs.
- 5. All persons seeking entrance to the Ground acknowledge BWFC's right to search any person whether outside or inside the Ground and to refuse entry to or eject from the Ground any person refusing to submit to such a search
- 6. The following articles must not be brought within the Ground knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground
- 7. The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. BWFC may impose a ban from the Ground as a result.
- Racial, homophobic or discriminatory abuse, chanting or harassment, or any such banners or flags, is strictly forbidden
 and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. BWFC may impose a ban from the Ground as a result.
- 8 Conviction of any of the following may result in a banning order being made –
- 8.1 The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse
- 8.2 The chanting of anything of an indecent or racialist nature.
- 8.3 The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.
- 8.4 Attempting to enter the Ground or being inside the ground whilst drunk.
- 8.5 Being in possession of any intoxicating liquor or can or other portable container and which could cause damage or personal injury, when entering the ground or in public area of the Ground from which the event can be directly viewed.
- 9. All persons entering the Ground may only occupy the seat/area allocated to them by their ticket and must not move from any one part of the ground to another without the express permission or instruction of any steward, officer of BWFC and/or any member of An Garda Siochana.
- 10. Nobody may stand in any seating area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the Ground.
- 11. The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places is strictly forbidden. Nobody entering the Ground shall be permitted to climb any structures within the Ground.
- 12. Smoking in No-Smoking Areas is strictly forbidden.
- 13. Mobile telephones and other communications devices are permitted within the Ground provided that they are used for personal and private use only.
- 14. Any individual who has entered any part of the Ground designated for the use of any group of supporters to which they do not belong may be ejected from the Ground either for the purpose of their own safety or for any other reason.
- 15. No person (other than a person who holds an appropriate licence) may bring into the Ground or use within the Ground any equipment which, is capable of recording or transmitting (by digital or other means) any audio, visual or audio-visual material or any information or data in relation to the Event or Ground. Copyright in any unauthorised recording or transmission is assigned to BWFC.
- 16. No goods (including literature) of any nature may be offered either free or for sale by any person within the Ground without the express written permission of BWFC.
- 17. Tickets are not transferable and may not be offered for sale without the prior written permission of BWFC. Any tickets offered for sale may be confiscated by any steward or officer of BWFC or any member of An Garda Siochana.
- 18. At all times while present in the Ground, persons must comply with any and all instructions of any steward and/or member of An Garda Siochana. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to immediate ejection from the Ground.
- 19. BWFC reserves absolutely the right to eject from the Ground any person failing to comply with any of the Ground Regulations or whose presence within the Ground is, or could, reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person. This could lead to further action including, but not limited to, a ban from the Ground or proceedings being taken.
- 20. Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the ground Regulations.




